Atlantic City resort has Montreal connections



f you book a visit at Revel, the gorgeous luxury hotelcasino in Atlantic City, your New Year's resolutions will be shot in no time. But it might be worth it.

Go ahead, drink, eat, smoke, gamble and ogle burlesque dancers pole-dancing in pasties and G-strings. You can clean up your act in 2014.

An astonishing \$2.4-billion showcase of contemporary architecture, Revel is a new landmark on the oceanfront skyline of Atlantic City and already is a celebrity magnet. Beyoncé sang at the opening party and since then VIPs have included Jennifer Lopez, model Christy Turlington and Kim Kardashian.

In a vintage town that has seen it all during the past 100 or so years of tourism, Revel is an original. It is a remarkable modern design, a streamlined monolith of blue-tinted glass that rises 47 storevs and reflects the sky above and the waves of the sea below. In a town where hotel size counts, Revel's gigantic ground area is equivalent to more than 100 football fields and it was built with the steel equivalent of five Eiffel towers.

The revolutionary aspect of Revel as a vacation getaway in a casino town is that its focus is not solely on slot machines, roulette and blackjack tables, as in most casino hotels. It is designed to be an urban resort, with nighttime beach parties, spa life and dining. And it's built so that all of the rooms have views of the ocean and Atlantic City's marvellous stretch of beach.

Once inside Revel, an escalator swoops guests up, up, up through 11 storeys of the Ellipse, a series of glass pavilions with views of the Atlantic far below. You're heading for 1,399 high-tech guest rooms, magnificent gardens and terraces, three nightclubs, a boutique alley, the Bask Spa and a stunning indoor-outdoor pool. Revel has 14 restaurants, large and small. Tough choices, but I singled out Amada, where Iron Chef Jose Garces does tapas and such specialties as all of the public and enterlobster paella and a bullish tainment spaces, including projected onto the textured cocktail called the Matador.
