High drama at Îles-de-la-Madeleine

SMALL FOUR-STAR HOTEL HAS LOCAL SEAFOOD, 10 fine rooms, dazzling views and plenty to do

The good life thrives in a 100-year-old convent on Les Îles-de-la-Madeleine.

Le Domaine du Vieux Couvent is a 10-room hotel with a dramatic location, high on a sandstone cliff overlooking the Gulf of St. Lawrence. With fine food, splendid panoramas and warm people, Le Domaine brings together the best elements of these special islands, a remote and unique part of Quebec, 135 kilometres north of Prince Edward Island.

Le Domaine's restaurant, La Moulière, serves freshly caught seafood, beautifully presented and so perfectly cooked that you will feel this is your first experience tasting scallops or cod. Acadian fiddle music dances in the background. Patrons always have requested tables with a view of the sunset and the sparkling water, so Le Domaine accommodated, open-

ing two additions last month: ible feature at Le Domaine a stunning sunroom for dining and a deck for drinks.

The tender loving care of four owners over the past 28 years has made Le Domaine a treasure of Les Îles de la Madeleine. And now the foursome

Évangéline Gaudet and Réginald Poirier, and Francine Leroux and Henri-Paul Bénard — have joined with new executive chef Denis Landry and his chef du cuisine, Serge Carbonneau.

"It started as a lark more than 25 years ago," said Poirier. "We wanted a friendly bar, then we added food and eventually guest rooms. Then we did a huge renovation to mod-

The rooms: a view and more

Le Domaine du Vieux Couvent is the only four-star hotel on Les Îles de la Madeleine, and its success is based partly on the distinguished 1914 building. It's all stone and hardwood floors, with high ceilings and large windows, and it is so substantial that it is naturally soundproof throughout.

But ultimately, the irresist-

is the splendid view. Each of the 10 guest rooms overlooks

When I arrived on a brilliantly sunny day a few weeks ago, my windows were all wide open, with the curtains drawn back and the sounds and sights of the sea flooding in. I didn't even ask about a television, although the inn will provide one on request.

The rooms are attractive and comfortable with good bedside lights, armoires, antique desks and club chairs (those are the loge seats for the performance of nature outside).

The beds are smothered in goose down duvets, and there are heaps of thick white bath sheets. The new showers are large glass walk-in numbers with rain faucets, spray arms and little benches. I tried the shower seat and, indeed, it was positioned so that I could gaze through a window at a lagoon

As in a larger hotel, guests have bathrobes, extra blankets and down pillows, and a leather-bound manual with tourist suggestions.

And there is Internet and a CD player with a library of music. Le Domaine supplies locally crafted toiletries from La Fille de la Mer, whose products are rich with jojoba oil, goats' milk, honey and vanilla.

What to eat

I lucked into meeting the next generation of Le Domaine's family: Raphaël Poirier, who mans the front desk in summer, and Charlélie Bénard, a keen sommelier and restaurateur.

La Moulière is a gourmet bistro offering a feast of seafood from the Gulf of St. Lawrence: cod cheeks with mango coulis, mussels marinière, lobster risotto, a warm salad with scallops and a rich seafood pie. The exceptional house chowder is brimming with seafood in a light, floral coconut milk broth. I didn't expect meat, but from local farms there are super-sized portions of beef ribs, braised lamb shank and the new burger, made of lamb, crab and the islands' pride, Tomme des Demoiselles cheese.

Charlélie Bénard has cre-

ated an admirable wine list with French bubbly, wines by the glass for creative pairings and a reserve section. He talks of tension, complexity and tannic structure, and nudges clients toward his favourite vintages from the Loire, Burgundy and Washington state, as well as a vidal blanc from Domaine des Salamandres in Hemmingford.

So much to do

For an excursion on land, Raphaël Poirier called the outdoor outfitter Le Pédalier and the company delivered top-notch rental bicycles. We toured for three hours along country roads, over hills, down to beaches and past clusters of the brightly coloured cottages that are a trademark of the islands. To connect to other islands, you can follow Route 199, which is part of La Route Verte, with bike lanes on a shared road.
